H	ligh risk (elevated risk of developing breast cancer, for which I will be taking
	preventative measures)
D	<b>Ductal carcinoma in situ</b> (Cancer that began in the milk ducts and has not spread outside the ducts. Accounts for about 20% of all breast cancers.)
lı	nvasive ductal carcinoma (Cancer that began in the milk ducts and has spread to nearby tissue. Accounts for about 75% of all breast cancers.)
lı	nvasive lobular carcinoma (Cancer that began in the milk producing glands of the breast and has spread to nearby tissue. About 10% of breast cancers are ILC.)
lı	nflammatory breast cancer (A type of invasive ductal carcinoma that blocks vessels in the skin of the breast, causing swelling, redness and pain. Accounts for 1-5% of all breast cancers.)
т	riple negative breast cancer (A type of invasive ductal carcinoma that does not have any of the receptors usually found in breast cancer and thus can't be treated with common treatments like hormone therapy and targeted therapy, leaving chemotherapy and immunotherapy as the primary options. Around 10-15% of breast cancers are triple negative.)
P	raget's disease of the breast (A rare form of breast cancer that affects the skin of the nipple. Most people with Paget's disease also have ductal carcinoma. Around 1-4% of breast cancers are Paget's Disease.)
^	Angiosarcoma (A very rare soft tissue cancer that begins in the blood or lymphatic vessels in the breast. Represents 0.1-0.2% of breast cancers.)
	thyllodes tumor (A rare tumor that starts in the connective tissue of the breast rather than the ducts or glands. Less than 1% of breast tumors are Phyllodes tumors, and most Phyllodes tumors are benign, although they can be cancerous.)  prefer not to say.
